- 1 drawn. And I think anyone in Government would realize
- this. There's turf lines drawn. We've got to make sure
- 3 that those turf lines disappear and remember that the
- 4 public are -- there's only one public, we're serving
- 5 them. We're all serving them. So I would be a little
- 6 afraid to go in that direction.
- 7 And I think you will see Government going in the
- 8 opposition direction. The new Government has just
- 9 announced a new department and it has taken a whole bunch
- of issues and they're delivering those services to
- 11 people. And I'm sure, if we really study that, we could
- say, "Well, there's conflicts here and there," but I
- think it's a more appropriate way to go.
- 14 Q. Let me move on to another related point. One of the
- things that has struck us about the Westray tragedy is
- 16 that, unlike a lot of other coal mine tragedies in the
- 17 past, in those cases the operator normally came in, very
- 18 quickly did whatever was needed to re-establish the mine,
- 19 recover bodies --
- 20 A. Uh-huh.
- 21 Q. -- complete an investigation and then carry on with
- 22 commercial operations. That didn't happen in this case.
- 23 We don't have good evidence as to what Curragh actually
- 24 put into the mine after the explosion, but we do know
- 25 that the Province, through its Department of Labour, had
